

Well, my friends, after three years, Israeli-Palestinian peace talks are to resume next week. I have to tell you, I love the peace process. How could I not? It's older than two of my children, one of whom is starting college in the fall. I have known the Peace Process longer than I have known Sammy and Rachel. It's like a part of the family, the sort of part of the family you thank God did not come from your side, and that you're glad lives very, very far away.
